

#9. Here are some of the Greek case endings:

A. Some nominative singular endings: - α - η - $\alpha\varsigma$ - $\eta\varsigma$ - $ο\varsigma$ - $ο\nu$ - ς

Some nominative plural endings: - $\alpha\iota$ - $οι$ - α - $\epsilon\varsigma$

Some genitive singular endings: - $\alpha\varsigma$ - $\eta\varsigma$ - $ου$ - $ο\varsigma$ - $\epsilon\omega\varsigma$

Some genitive plural endings: - $\omega\nu$

Some dative singular endings: - α with a ι subscript - η with a ι subscript

- ω with a ι subscript - ι

Some dative plural endings: - $\alpha\iota\varsigma$ - $οι\varsigma$ - $\sigma\iota(\nu)$

Some accusative singular endings: - $\alpha\nu$ - $\eta\nu$ - $ο\nu$ - α - ς

Some accusative plural endings: - ᾶς - οὺς - ᾱ - ᾶς - εἶς

Some vocative endings (see how Yehuda uses the vocative when he called the

believers “Beloved”: often the same as the nominative but

sometimes just - εἰς is added to the noun stem
